Managing Invasives on Your Property

Invasives

- Can be native or non-native (exotic)
- Can be aggressive and out compete natives
- Can take over the full property
- Harmful to flora and fauna
- Removal may not be easy



Phragmites

- Found near wetlands
- Grows quickly and loves disturbance
- Rhizome roots
- Outcompetes native grasses
- Solutions:
 - Mow or cut before seed
 - Herbicide
 - Native seeds in-between treatment



Multifloral Rose

- Thorny woody, grows in fields, and forest edges
- Grows into dense patches
- Crowds out other plants
- Solutions:
 - Mow or mulch before flowering
 - Mow often over years
 - Hand pulling
 - Herbicides



Japanese Knotweed

- ▶ Tall, thick, and bamboo like
- Loves disturbance
- Removal can make worse
- DO NOT MOW OR MULCH
- Takes over
- Solutions:
 - Needs to be carefully removed
 - All materials needs to be picked up
 - Bagged to dry out, then burn it
 - Herbicides needed (Foliar or stem injection)
 - Multi-year effort (don't give up)





Garlic Mustard

- Small, blooms second year
- Seed invades fields and woodlands
- Displaces native vegetation
- Changes soil conditions to prevents growth of other plants
- Solutions:
 - Hand pulling
 - Mowing before flowers
 - Herbicides
 - Annual work





Oriental Bittersweet

- Woody vine, climbs trees
- Fruits yellow-orange capsules, red inside
- Invades fields, forest, and forest edges
- Dense mats, smothers everything
- Solutions:
 - Hand pulling young vines
 - Repeated mowing in fields
 - Small pieces can regenerate
 - Cut vines when leaves are not present (trees)
 - Herbicides (triclopyr-based)









Others

- Autumn Olive
- Buckthorn (Common and Glossy)
- Purple Loosestrife
- Tree-of-Heaven
- Mile-a-minute Vine
- Kudzu
- Many others

- Not a complete list
- Some natives can be aggressive
- Check before you buy
