10.2. <u>Document 80</u>; Attorney Robert Harb, for applicant *Shoe City Development Corporation* owned by *Haverhill Housing Authority*, requests Special Permit, *CCSP 23-9*, Assessor's Map 423-151-18A & 423-151-1B, to expand an existing 4-unit multifamily dwelling at 335 Groveland st and 0 Katsaros dr, to an 8-unit multifamily dwelling, in an RH zone *Comments from City Depts are included*

President Jordan opened the special permit hearing.

Attorney Robert Harb, offices located at 40 Kenoza Avenue, here representing Shoe City Development Corporation, a wholly owned corporation of the Haverhill Housing Authority. This is a permit to expand and already existing multifamily dwelling. We received all the necessary variances from the board of appeals; nobody was in objection to our petition. Also wanted to draw to your attention, although this is an expansion from a four to an eight, part of the existing structure was already renovated to a living room which was part of one of the units in the front of the building. The building fits into the neighborhood. Behind the building is Kennedy Circle which is already managed by the Haverhill Housing Authority. We need housing, especially senior housing. We are taking an existing rear structure and converting it into four units. There will be no exterior changes to the building which faces Groveland Street. All the changes will be in the rear portion of the building. There is plenty of parking for the units on the HHA land. No objections from the neighbors.

For the record, we meet the requirements for Chapter 255 Section 10.4.2. The structure does not cause any harm to the neighborhood, building out an existing framework in the rear; there are no changes to the exterior; housing needed for seniors; the traffic and parking has been approved; adequate utilities with city water and sewer; it already looks like it belongs in the neighborhood; no impact to the environment; and certainly, will have no adverse impact on city services. Those are our technical requirements under the special permit.

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Department Heads that had comments submitted them. The Planning Director supports this. Conservation had no objections. The Fire Department requirements for sprinklers and alarms will be met. There are provisions on the plans for trash. We believe we meet all the department requirements and would ask for approval.

Angelo Petrozzelli, Design Partnership Architects, presented the drawings. The front building will remain as is but will renovate the existing four units in that building. They are approximately 700 sq. ft. each. The new building will be in the rear. The garage and upper part of the building are already built and will be added onto the end giving four units on the back. The ground floor unit towards Kenndy Circle will have one disabled unit. The second floor will have a continuous porch so each unit will have two egresses. The building will be brought to new codes of today. Will add flower boxes to Groveland Street side of building.

President Jordan asked if anyone would like to speak in favor?

Ken Quimby, Jr., 48 Goodale Street, he is thrilled and hopes this is a first step for more senior housing because it is desperately needed in the city.

Andrew Herlihy, Community Development, we are very proud to be supporting this on behalf of the city. It represents a couple of important things. It's a renewed partnership between the city and Haverhill Housing Authority, all the board members are here. It is one of the first new HHA units in about four decades. The city needs as many units as possible we can get for 40B. This adds another eight units to our inventory. The only affordable housing money for the city comes from the HUD Home Investment Partner Program. Through the American Rescue Plan, seven million dollars was funded for Essex County where this project was awarded one million of that. We will also be using some Community Development money for improvements to the open space park on Katsaros Drive.

President Jordan asked if anyone would like to speak in opposition? No one spoke.

President Jordan closed the hearing.

Motion by Councilor Bevilacqua to approve, second Councilor Toohey

Councilor Sullivan loves the flower boxes and the improvements to the public space across the street. The best part of this project is that it will increase affordable senior housing. As stated, it has been decades since we have created a meaningful addition to senior housing. The challenge is where do we go from here and how we get more in the future. Thanked all the board members for the work they do.

Vice President Michitson states it is a very important project. Been working with a resident who is in need of housing and trying to find a location. Bottom line is we desperately need this housing.

Councilor Rogers feels this project is great and fits well in the neighborhood. Only wish more units could be built.

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Councilor Barrett, like her fellow Councilors, thinks it is a great project. It fits in and meets a need which helps. Happy the Haverhill Housing Authority has chosen to proceed with this project.

Councilor Bevilacqua has had many discussions with Chairman Driscoll and the Haverhill Housing Authority. This is a tremendous project. My only regret is that there aren't more units. Urge to continue moving forward. The Haverhill Housing Authority has an excellent record in management and taking care of people. Would like someone to tell me why more units were not added because it seems like it would fit in with the character of the hospital.

Angelo Petrozzelli stated the site is limited. It would have to have many variances to increase height and would have to increase parking. Do not have the available area. Hopefully there will be other sites available through this group that can bring more elderly apartments.

President Jordan agrees with everything colleagues said. It's a wonderful project and fully support it. We all know there is an incredible need for housing, particularly affordable housing for seniors. Thrilled you are doing this project and thrilled the Haverhill Housing Authority is stepping up again. We desperately need more. Great job with the design and fully supports it.
