President Jordan announced a 10-minute recess before starting the budget orders.

Mayor Fiorentini addressed the Council. Thanked the Council for their input on the budget over the last 40 days. Made compromises and concessions in response to what the council wanted. Thanked for no further talk of zeroing out the budget. Know it was just a negotiating tactic. Asked the Council to vote for the budget and the amendments with one further amendment being made tonight. Budget increases funding for public education mostly due to the Student Opportunity Act and because the city increased funding; increases funding for the police department for social workers; extra money for highway workers; sidewalk improvements; calls for increases in fire department for four new firefighters if we don't get the grant and four new dispatchers so can put back in the stations. Ask to vote for amendments first, then vote for the budget.

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The Mayor read the list of amendments proposed totaling FY23 Budget Increases to \$1,428,520. (President Jordan asked Mayor to clarify the Youth Stabilization & Mental Health Fund will be \$750K total. Mayor said if budget passes tonight an additional \$250K would be added to the \$500K for total of \$750K).

Proposed Revenue Increases total \$1,008,288.

Possible Budget Reductions total \$420,232.

Mayor asks respectively that the Council vote on the amendments.

Motion by Councillor Bevilacqua, second Councillor Barrett

Councillor McGonagle asked the Mayor about their conversation earlier for \$200K for a fire boat. Mayor pledged \$200K ARPA funds for fire boat.

Councillor McGonagle stated didn't receive everything wanted in budget, feels it is a good budget but still need to work on morale, manning, and personnel at Fire Department. Likes the program of work/life balance at the Haverhill Police Department. Appreciates Mayor working with him and will support budget.

Councillor Michitson would like to make an amendment but cannot make without the Mayors approval: He is requesting the current minimum manning of the firefighters is 21, 19 in suppression and 2 in dispatch. Wants Mayor to agree to keep the minimum manning of 21 with 20 suppression and 1 in dispatch, will support budget if supports amendment.

Mayor stated a study is being done and introduced Thomas Wieczorek of Center for Public Safety Management. Mr. Wieczorek, CPSM attended remotely. Former fire chief, city manager, headed up commission on fire accreditation. CPSM focus is on dispatch, police, fire, EMS and homeland security. Stated Chief Pozzo will be heading up this project, he is head of Fire and EMS services who has 42 years in fire service.

Councillor Michitson asked mayor if that is a "no" to his amendment. He stated he wanted to be clear that the City Council was not going to defund the city. We have been strong supporters of the Police Dept. wanted to be very clear on that. The council was looking for was a way to take an honorable stand for public safety. The mayor kept his word with the four new firefighters in reserve if the Safer grant doesn't come in. Stated it is up to the Mayor to break the log jam with the fire department. Mayor stated he would wait until the study is completed.

Councillor Sullivan spoke about the Dutton airport site as a possible site for a new fire station and would like the study to look at that site. Mayor and Mr. Wieczorek stated they would include in study.

Councillor Lewandowski echoes what Councillor Michitson said. Like 99.9% of budget but doesn't get support without amendment that Michitson made. It's about public safety. It's about the safety of the firefighters and the residence they serve.

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Councillor Bevilacqua stated we must be responsible to the city, worst economic crisis for most, been talking to many over last few weeks all concerned. Stated City Council threatened to defund the city.

President Jordan corrected Councillor Bevilacqua stating the Council never threatened to defund the city. Councillor Bevilacqua rephrased to say vote to zero out. *President Jordan and Councillor Bevilacqua exchanged comments back and forth regarding what was said at the June 16th budget meeting wanted to correct for the record. Councillor McGonagle stated people were told something that was not accurate. It wasn't the Council who rallied all to be here and know where it came from. The Mayor agreed it come from him. Councillor Michitson stated it's about taking a stand.

Councillor Rogers asked Mr. Wieczorek if the study included minimum manning, survey of firehouses by walking through them, timeframe, evaluation of the exiting contract with the city, and who gets the reports? Mr. Wieczorek said will have a team on the ground looking into all aspects. Usually takes 120-days, draft reports will be reviewed by all, will have to check who gets final report.

Councillor Rogers asked the Mayor about the \$750K mental health and the \$250K for the fire boat? Mayor said will use ARPA money for \$250 mental health and can line transfer the \$250 for the fire boat.

Councillor Barrett commented the budget is solid, not perfect. Fills gaps. Wanted to confirm mental health \$250K for programs for children and \$250K for direct mental health services. Wish budget season could be less dramatic. Will support.

Councillor Toohey wanted to thank his colleagues and appreciates how passionate they are. Asked in the future if we could respect one another a little bit more. Thanked the Mayor and the administration for providing a budget that makes sense. Having passed 14 budgets, understands the challenges involved. Wanted everyone to know that the Council is very supportive of the city's personnel on every level. The budget is not 100% but it is a very good budget. In the future, with a little more hard work and transparency with the Mayor and the fire department, a few more doors can be opened. Wanted to ask the Chief if the fire study can include the area of Route 97 for a fire station. Mayor and Chief stated it would be included in the study.

President Jordan read a comment from a Haverhill Citizen: "How can the public feel assured emergency services are able to adequately protect us when they tell us they do not have the resources or man power to do so? If the fire department is not able to work efficiently, aren't you doing the public a disservice?"

Mayor response said that is what the study is about, of course we want public safety.

Ryan Fairbanks, Firefighter, stated that it is a scary question and one they rustle with all the time. City has many buildings that have been converted from old mill factories, some of the largest

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converted mill buildings in the state. Retrofitted building typically are not as safe. Been asking for three years for more staffing. Always told will deal during budget time, here we are again. NFPA 1710 Standards for high rise on scene is 50 and timeline is 8-12 minutes; nearest ladder is 14 minutes away and show up with only 16; two studies in 10 years; police have had zero staffing studies; studies are skewed to who pays for them; we offered to fund but was rejected; evaluated model being accepted tonight against one from one year ago only gave six extra firefighters for the year; trying to make job and city safer; meet zero NFPA standards; have one ladder and four pumps; lowest staff gateway city in state; 34 more police and 6 six less firefighters in last six years; we meet zero NFPA response metrics.

President Jordan stated his two concerns are youth services mental health and glad it has been addressed; second sticking point is keeping our firefighters safe by having more firefighters on duty, would concede if could keep minimum manning to 21, but now 20; looking forward to the studies results; will vote for amendments; do appreciate Mayor going up on youth mental health but cannot vote for a budget that doesn't guarantee more firefighters.
