That Eight Hundred Fifty Three Thousand Dollars (\$853,000) is appropriated for engineering services for the development of plans and specifications for road and bridge reconstruction on North Avenue, including the payment of all costs incidental and related thereto; that to meet this appropriation, the Treasurer, with the approval of the Mayor, is authorized to borrow said amount pursuant to Chapter 44, Section 7(7) of the General Laws, or pursuant to any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds or notes of the City therefor.

<u>Further Ordered</u>: That any premium received by the City upon the sale of any bonds or notes approved by this order, less any such premium applied to the payment of the costs of issuance of such bonds or notes, may be applied to the payment of costs approved by this order in accordance with Chapter 44, Section 20 of the General Laws, thereby reducing the amount authorized to be borrowed to pay such costs by a like amount.

<u>Further Ordered</u>: That the Treasurer is authorized to file an application with the appropriate officials of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts (the "Commonwealth") to qualify under Chapter 44A of the General Laws any and all bonds of the City authorized to be borrowed pursuant to this loan order and to provide such information and execute such documents as such officials of the Commonwealth may require in connection therewith.

Dear Madame. President and Members of the Haverhill City Council:

Please see attached an order authorizing the Mayor to borrow \$853,000.00 to fund the engineering services for the development of plans and specifications for road and bridge reconstruction on North Avenue. This project will remake North Avenue to the Plaistow Line and make critically needed repairs to the Frye Pond Dam.

The City has selected a designer for the project to reconstruct North Avenue. While the project construction costs would be paid by Federal Highway Association (80%) and MassDOT (20%), it is the City's responsibility to pay for the design. We have gone out to bid for design services, and the low bid was \$853,000. We are still negotiating and it is possible that it will end up at a lower amount.

The City does have some funds from Wingate Nursing Home Expansion to apply to the design costs. We received \$400,000 from the developer, as the council might recall, as part of settlement of their lawsuit. That \$400,000 is part of the reason we are able to proceed with this project. We used a portion of it for preliminary design. There is \$335,983.20 remaining in that account.

Normally I would suggest borrowing only the remaining \$516,916.80. In light of the projected difficulties in next year's budget, I suggest we borrow the entire amount and use the \$335,000 to help balance next year's budget.

This project was slated to begin in 2023. The State has proposed moving it to 2026, which the city strongly opposes. We are attempting to persuade the state to allow us to move the project forward to 2022 so that the critical repairs to the dam can be made.

We cannot move forward unless we have a designer on board and we have the design underway. Allowing this bond authorization will allow us to hire the designer and give us a chance to move forward.

The total construction portion of the project is a little over \$17 million. An investment of \$853,000 to gain \$17 million in construction money is a worthwhile investment. This bond order must be placed on file for two weeks, after which time I recommend approval.

MassDOT performs routine structural inspections and underwater inspections at the North Ave over Snows Brook bridge (bridge H-12-23), and all bridges in the State. The City typically receives a copy of the final reports a couple months after the initial inspection. I have not received any such inspections for this bridge in the last year, so I would anticipate receiving a report soon, the State likely running a little behind in finalizing reports due to Covid-related limited staffing. In conjunction with the inspections MassDOT makes, the City receives notice of any Critical items that need to be addressed. If the recent MassDOT inspections at this bridge determined there were Critical items that needed to be addressed immediately we would have been so informed.

For this bridge the City received notice in 2017 that the deteriorated condition of the bridge rails required that we take action. The City then installed concrete jersey barriers, notified MassDOT, and MassDOT closed out the Critical item. Several months ago the City received word that the concrete jersey barriers were now not considered adequate, and that a more robust barrier was required (we were told this was also the case at the Rosemont Street over Little River bridge (H-12-24). After evaluating several options it was determined that installing steel barriers was the most cost effective option that was approvable by the State. These barriers were put in place at the two bridges this week. The City will be placing sand filled barrels at the four barrier ends at each bridge, and next week the barrier company will be pinning the barriers to the roadway.

Regarding weight limit posting, based on their inspections MassDOT has not required weight posting to date.

The bridge is scheduled to be replaced as part of the North Avenue Reconstruction Project, which is currently on the State TIP list for Construction funding in FFY23. The associated Frye Pond Dam will either be removed or rehabilitated as part of the project. As with all MassDOT funded projects, after the design reaches the 25% stage MassDOT will hold a Public Hearing to inform of the proposed design and solicit input from the City.

RESPONSE FROM ROBERT WARD, DEPUTY DIRECTOR, WATER/WASTEWATER

John,

To answer your question, the numbers in our annual CSO report on the website are accurate. The modeled average CSO volume of 20 million gallons per year is for a typical rainfall year. The last two years have been very wet and resulted in 49.5 million gallons and 43.6 million gallons for 2019 and 2018, respectively. In 2014, we installed flow meters in our CSOs, so the annual reports since then reflect metered, not computer-modeled numbers.

In response to some of the other points in Mr. Taylor's email below, I offer the following information.

He states, "During heavy rainstorms, the combined volume of this stuff overwhelms the treatment plant...." CSOs occur out in the sewer system, not at the treatment plant. Combined sewer systems were designed to overflow when the pipes are overwhelmed to avoid flooding streets, basements, etc. I think it is essential to understand that our treatment plant does not discharge any untreated sewage.

I do not understand what Mr. Taylor means by his remark about updating the website "to accurately describe how much CSO we are, in fact, dumping." The overflow numbers we report on the website are from monitoring equipment at each CSO structure. The report on the website lists every CSO activation that occurs over the entire year, including date and time the overflow starts and stops, the rainfall associated with the overflow, and the volume of the overflow. Attached to this email is one page out of our annual CSO report to give you an idea of the level of detail.

It is important to know that the Environmental Protection Agency and the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection strictly regulate our activities and reporting. We are required by law to report accurate information, including CSO activations, sewer system overflows, discharge of any untreated sewage of any kind, etc..

When it comes to investing in public works infrastructure, Haverhill has over \$70 million in water and sewer capital projects alone, either completed within the last couple of years or in construction right now. Projects include the water treatment plant upgrade, drinking water system piping improvements, sewer pumping station improvements, Phase 3 CSO program work, wastewater treatment plant improvements, and sewer collection system improvements. The water and sewer 5-year capital program includes additional future work at the wastewater treatment plant, Phase 3 CSO program construction, and pumping station improvements, to name a few. These projects are all funded by the ratepayers.
