Mayor Barrett addressed the council. She noted this has been before you before. We are trying to acquire this critical piece of our water infrastructure.

Robert Ward, DPW Director, addressed the council. He noted this authorizes the acquisition of 309 East Broadway and secure the funding to purchase. He stated after earlier concerns about eminent domain taking, the city reached an agreement with the property owner to acquire the 7.5 acres property for 1.8 million for public water supply project. The owner will not contest the taking, with the transfer to happen at the end of July.

Rob Williamson of Wright Pierce addressed the council. He went over the PowerPoint presentation describing the well, how they came to find the site. Robert Ward reported that the latest estimated cost of the project is approximately \$26 million, exceeding the original loan authorization approved in 2016. He explained that additional funding will eventually be required and noted that water supply fees collected from developers have helped finance portions of the project. Rob Williamson stated that significant permitting work has already been completed and that only limited permitting remains.

Attorney Michael Leon, the City’s outside counsel, provided an overview of the negotiated taking agreement for the 7.5-acre Hill property. He explained that the City will acquire the property through an Order of Taking for the appraised value of \$1.8 million, plus moving expenses. Attorney Leon noted that the agreement eliminates future challenges to the taking or valuation, clears any title issues, and provides the City with full ownership and control of the property for water supply purposes. Recording the taking is expected at the end of July to allow additional time for the property owners to vacate the premises. Several Councilors discussed the future use of the approximately 2-acre portion of the property containing the residence. Councilor Sullivan expressed concerns regarding any future sale of the property and whether such action could raise concerns with the Massachusetts Department of



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Environmental Protection (DEP). Attorney Leon stated that while the City would have flexibility in the future, any disposal of the property would require additional municipal action and review. He emphasized that the acquisition is being made entirely for water supply and protection purposes. Councilor Basiliere and Attorney Leon discussed the legal framework surrounding eminent domain. Attorney Leon explained a “friendly” eminent domain acquisition that provides full compensation to the property owners while serving a public purpose. Councilor Basiliere emphasized that eminent domain protections are rooted in constitutional principles requiring public use and just compensation. Councilor Diodati asked how much time the City is saving by avoiding litigation. Attorney Leon stated that while a taking becomes effective upon recording, disputes over valuation can take one to three years to resolve through litigation. Because the negotiated agreement establishes a final valuation, no future legal challenges are anticipated. Councilor Diodati also expressed support for retaining the property for future municipal use. Councilor Lewandowski praised the negotiated settlement and highlighted the long-term value of securing an expanded water supply for future generations. Attorney Leon added that the project will strengthen the City’s water resources and provide greater certainty for future economic development while utilizing groundwater drawn from beneath the Merrimack River rather than direct river withdrawals. Councilors McGonagle and LePage raised concerns regarding the acquisition of the house and surrounding acreage, as well as environmental responsibilities associated with underground oil tanks located on the property. Attorney Leon confirmed that the City is acquiring the property “as is” and will assume responsibility for any associated issues. He noted that future decisions regarding the property’s use remain open. Councilor Toohey expressed strong support for the acquisition, stating that the City is addressing a significant long-term water supply challenge and praising both the negotiated approach and the efforts of those involved in the project. President Jordan stated that he was pleased the matter had been resolved and asked for clarification regarding project financing. Robert Ward confirmed that approximately \$917,000 in existing Water Department capital funds will be used toward the purchase, with the remaining balance financed through bonding. The discussion concluded with general agreement that the acquisition represents an important investment in the City’s future water supply infrastructure.

Maria Elena Arata addressed the council. She noted the multicultural festival showcases the diverse talents and cultures discovered through its grant program. This event is supported by volunteers, local leaders and community partners. The free event promotes unity, inclusion and community pride. John Hanson addressed the council. He noted there are variety of exhibits, vendors, food trucks and various acts. It will be a full day of activities from 12-6.

Councilor Melissa Lewandowski raised concerns about increased traffic and safety issues on Shapleigh Street following the May 6 partial house collapse on Water Street, which required a temporary detour through the neighborhood. Lt. Kevin Lynch explained that the detour was moved back to Boardman Street because it is wider and better suited for truck traffic, noting that many truck drivers follow GPS directions despite posted signage. Mayor Barrett reported that the City is working with the property owner and insurance representatives to secure the damaged building as quickly as possible, while acknowledging the impact on displaced residents. Resident Bruce Baxter (5 Shapleigh Avenue) thanked Councilor Lewandowski, the Mayor's Office, and the Police Department for responding to neighborhood concerns and implementing changes that provided immediate relief.

Andrew Herlihy addressed the council. He noted the city will receive \$940,208 in the community block grant. That equals a 2.44% increase over last year. The city has received the CDBG funds for 52 years, totaling about \$59 million. The council’s approval is needed for the mayor to submit the annual grant plan and budget. The federal rules limit spending on administration and non-profit grants that serve low-moderate income residents. He also noted the proposed CDBG budget will continue to prioritize housing rehabilitation, neighborhood improvements and support low and moderate income residents. Funds will also support economic development initiatives and address unsafe vacant properties. He stated the city will begin the required public comment process.

Mayor Barrett addressed the council. She noted this is a roof replacement and approximately 76% of the cost will be reimbursed through the grant, substantially reducing the expense.

Councilor Rogers noted that the project cost had increased to approximately \$3.5 million, plus an additional \$300,000 for the schools, bringing the total to nearly \$4 million. Mayor Barrett clarified that the City would not be paying the full \$4 million. Councilor Rogers responded that taxpayer dollars would ultimately fund the project, to which Mayor Barrett agreed, adding that the funds would not come solely from Haverhill taxpayers. Councilor Rogers questioned whether the City was required to proceed through the current process and whether obtaining a direct quote might result in a lower cost. Mayor Barrett explained that if the City funded the project independently, the cost would likely be around \$4 million, whereas the current process allows for a 75 percent reimbursement. Clancy Main of the School Department addressed the Council and stated that, after reimbursement from the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA), the City’s share of the project would range from approximately \$661,000 in the best-case scenario to \$815,000 in the worst-case scenario. He explained that the project had undergone the required due diligence and schematic design phases and that professional estimators had reviewed and priced the project to ensure the costs were reasonable and accurate.
