Councillor Sullivan made motion based on last week's meeting, don't think the ADU ordinance as proposed is ready. We need to vet it out and won't be successfully done here tonight. Think it should go to the subcommittee Administration and Finance where the public will be invited and have a more thorough discussion so that we can meet some of these objections and clarify misinformation.

Richard MacDonald, Director of Inspectional Services, appeared before the Council. It was clear at last week's meeting that the Council was looking for more information and answers to questions regarding Accessory Dwelling Units (ADU). First ADU ordinance was created in 1992. Since that time approximately 200 ADU's were permitted in the city. In the last two years, 20 ADU's have been granted. Not all have moved forward. Most ADU requests are for family members. Point being, there has not been a lot of interest in its current form. An ADU is an accessory to the principal use not considered multi-family housing. There are illegal units through the city. Investigate one per week. This is about addressing our housing needs and doing so in a mythological, safe manner. Do not expect ordinance to create a large amount of applications that will be processed. ADU's are expensive to build and the primary structure must be owner occupied. They are limited in size, only one allowed on property and cannot have separate utilities. All proposed AUD's require permits and must go through the city's development review.

16. Unfinished Business Of Preceding Meeting:

16.1. <u>Document 112:</u> CCSP 22-13: Jeffrey Brem for Aaron Orso, Cedarcrest Homes requests Hearing for a Flexible Development, Pursuant to Chapter 255, Section 8.4 of the Haverhill Zoning Code; Mohawk Trail; a single family home development at 188 Lake st *Not Passed November 29th*

Councillor Lewandowski: So, rest there be any speculation as to why I filed this motion for reconsideration very briefly, after we left the last meeting there was negotiation with the developer. He made substantial changes to his proposal that warrant reconsider in my estimation. There are some mitigating effects he has put into place and a motion for reconsideration is simply the most efficient way to bring this back before the Council. I will say, specifically; the material changes include a reduction from fourteen to eleven units. Also, there will be frontage and side set back increases to all of those units. The developer has committed to razing (tearing) down the barn per our request and discussion at the last meeting. There will also be an installation of a community area or park which will include buffering trees, benches, a patio area, tables, etc. and that will be an ongoing process and discussion with the neighbors as to what works best. There will be additional buffering to directly impacted neighbors as well. The open space will be increased by over an acre. Given all of this, I would make a motion of reconsideration based on those substantial changes, second Councillor Sullivan

President Jordan: I did speak with City Solicitor Bill Cox today. We will hear from Councillors who will want to weigh in on this but procedurally, we will have a vote on whether to reconsider the vote. We only need a simple majority of five. If that does pass, then we have a vote on the item itself. As was needed last time, we need a two-thirds majority for it to pass. The hearing was closed, so we are not going to hear from anyone else on this but Councillors on comments on the reconsideration.

Councillor Bevilacqua: I have a procedural question on the reconsideration. Does the reconsideration go for the original proposal because I always believed that to do this type of change would require a repetitive petition under the zoning ordinance which first goes to the planning board and gives the neighbors and abutters and opportunity to speak and then it comes back to the City Council. I believed, but I could be wrong, I am just asking I didn't know that the City Solicitor had been asked this question. I believe that the reconsideration would go for the original proposal but that to make material substantial changes that we do that under a repetitive petition process in the zoning ordinance in Haverhill.

President Jordan: Based on my conversation with City Solicitor today, no that is not the case. Councillor Lewandowski being on the prevailing side of the vote is allowed to request reconsideration by noon time on Thursday following last Tuesday's vote. She made that in that time frame. Speaking with him today, this is the procedurally correct way to do it.
